# Online Learning Platforms



#### CBeebies Little Learners app launched this week.

CBeebies Little Learners is a learning app from CBeebies and BBC Bitesize, that puts the fun into learning!

Aimed at 2-4 year-olds, the app is free to download with no adverts or in-app purchases and children can play independently and offline, wherever they are.

It's packed with free CBeebies and BBC Bitesize games and videos featuring CBeebies characters, and all the activities are based on the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) curriculum.



#### 1-minute Maths

The White Rose 1-minute maths app helps children build greater number confidence and fluency. It's all about targeted practice in engaging, one-minute chunks! It is free to download from Google Play and the Apple App Store.



#### **Purple Mash**

Children in Year 1 and 2 have access to Purple Mash, a whole world of fun and exciting learning opportunities in one safe online space.

It includes learning tools and content, designed for children aged 3 to 11 in the classroom and at home. Purple Mash supports learning through its resources, games and creative tools, tailored to the school curriculum; everything from core subjects such as maths, reading, writing and phonics, to all the other topics learnt in school.

The log-in details can be found in their reading record.



#### **Numbots for Maths**

<u>Numbots</u> supports the understanding of number bonds and helps addition and subtraction skills. These are the essential building blocks for maths concepts and lots of repetition of key facts can support fluency and speed. The children in Years 1 and 2 have individual logins and can build their own robots and collect rewards as they learn.

NumBots can be played on a browser (play.numbots.com) or via the app, which is free to download on Amazon, Android and Apple devices. In order to get the best out of NumBots, we recommend that children play regularly for short bursts at a time, aiming for 3 minutes, five times a week. It is great fun!

#### Oxford Owl and Reading

Learning to read is essential for success in life. The more support and encouragement that you can offer your child, the more likely it is that they will make good progress.

At Alwyn, we are using the Floppy's Phonics teaching programme. It is a systematic approach to teaching the letters and sounds (the alphabetic code) that are needed to read and spell. To reinforce the learning in school, your child takes home a reading book to practise these sounds and build fluency. It is important to read these books more than once over a few days. Please try to read with your child every day,

As well as reading books, your child can access <u>Floppy's Phonics online</u>. This resource can be used to access more books and the 'Floppy's Phonics extra practice zone'. Here you will be able to find the corresponding sound to match your child's worksheet and use the interactive online book. The children will be familiar with these from the classroom.

If you have any questions or difficulties, speak to your child's class teacher. We will also be running some online safety sessions for children, families and staff in February.

#### The School Gates

Thank you for supporting the new gate opening and closing times: 8.40am - 9.00am and 3.10pm - 3.35pm

The opening times allow movement between our two schools and provide different points of access which should help with traffic and parking in our area.

The gate opening times are different from the time your child is required to be in school.

#### The Importance of Being on Time

Reception children need to be in school at 8.45am.

Year 1 and 2 children need to be in school at 8.50am.

The classroom doors will open at these times and close as soon as the last child in the line enters the classroom; this usually takes less than 3 minutes. Any child arriving after the classroom door is shut, will be marked as late. Knocking on the classroom door once it is closed is disruptive to the children as their teacher is having to keep opening the door instead of settling their class for the morning. Please be on time every morning.

It can be worrying for a child to enter a classroom late especially when their classmates are sat on the carpet ready to learn. All children should have come into school, put their belongings in the cloakroom, their book bag in their drawer and their water bottle in the tray and have been registered before 9am each morning.

#### **Attendance Matters**

Being in school every day is extremely important for all children in order to receive the best possible start to their learning. Your child's attendance is vital to a successful education, as this is the foundation for lifelong learning. Lessons are planned in sequences and if a child misses a part of this sequence, they are at a disadvantage when it comes to committing that learning to long term memory.

If your child is slightly under the weather, but well enough to come into school, send them in and mention it to the class teacher. They will keep an eye on your child and phone you if there are any concerns.

#### Reason for absence

Please let the office know the specific reason for your child's absence rather than feeling unwell or ill. This helps us monitor any small outbreaks of similar virus' and supports the recording of absence.


#### **Medical Appointments**

If you have a medical appointment during the school day, inform the school before the appointment and provide a GP/Hospital appointment card or letter.

#### Holidays during Term Time

We will not authorise requests for holidays during term time. Fixed Penalty Notices can be issued to parents who take their children out of school for holidays.

Please ensure that you make all reasonable efforts to send your child into school.



# Ideas for Learning Chats

#### What have Reception been learning?

This week the children have moved on to learning Stage 2 'green' sounds, starting with /j/ and /v/. In maths we've moved on to the composition of 6, 7 and 8. We've continued to learn about Chinese new year and about staying safe

Ask me to write 'jam' and 'vet'.

Ask me to show you different ways I can make 6 with my fingers.

Ask me to tell you who I can tell if I don't feel safe.

Ask me to retell the story of Six Dinner Sid.

Next week, we will be learning 'w' and 'x' in phonics and continuing to explore 6, 7 and 8 in maths.

#### What have Year 1 been learning this week, Miss Harris?

Year 1 had such fun designing and baking their gingerbread people in DT. We then took them home to eat. Yum yum!

In English, we wrote our own instruction sentences to explain how we made our gingerbread people, using time words and bossy verbs.

In maths we have been using our number bonds to 10 to solve problems involving number bonds to 20.

#### Ask me to read the words:

looked, jumped, played, helped, kicked

Ask me about the phoneme and the grapheme

Ask me how I can use 5+2= 7, to find the answer to 15+2=?.

Ask me how I made my gingerbread person

Ask me to name a reptile

Ask me to tell you the features of a reptile

Ask me to tell you why old Alwyn closed

Next week we will be learning about Chinese New Year, continuing to explore 'old Alwyn' in our History lessons with a special visit from an ex pupil and learning about doubles and near doubles in maths.

#### What have Year 2 been learning this week?

This week we have been continuing with multiplication and division in maths. We have used resources to solve word problems and to support and deepen our learning. In SPaG we have learnt that homophones are words that sound the same but are spelt differently and we have practised spelling and writing different homophones. As scientists, we have planned an experiment for next week to test whether different materials are waterproof. We had to predict which materials we thought were waterproof and would therefore be suitable for an umbrella. Luckily for the children, we will not be sending the ones who predicted felt as a suitable material out in the pouring rain to test their predictions!

Ask me to show you how I can share 24 into groups of 4.

Ask me to show you how I can share 24 sweets between 4 friends.

Ask me to tell you what waterproof means.

Ask me to use 2 words to describe the properties of an umbrella.

Ask me what a homophone is.

Ask me to spell see and sea.

Next week we are learning the 2 and 10 times tables and related division facts.

# **School Keep Clear**



#### Why do I have to leave it clear?

For safety - to ensure clear sight lines for both motorists and children, as well as for other road users, outside schools. They provide a clear area in which children and adults can cross more safely.

Am I okay just to pick up on the zig-zag markings if I am only there for a second?

Under no circumstance should you stop on zig-zag markings at any time, even just for a second. A stationary car can prevent a driver seeing a child crossing the road.

#### But it's raining, can I just drop off?

Don't be pressured by bad weather into parking on the Keep Clear zig-zags.

Rule 238 of the Highway Code states;

"You MUST NOT wait or park, or stop to set down and pick up passengers, on school entrance markings when upright signs indicate a prohibition of stopping."

Better a wet coat than parking illegally which could result in a fine.

Keep the Zig-Zags clear- No excuses!



The Road Safety Officers at RBWM have created some information posters to share with the community as part of their 'New year, New you, New parking' campaign. They help to remind drivers of how to park safely and considerately and the laws regarding parking especially near schools.






